Indians to decide the membership issue,
Section 12,(1) (a) and (b), before the
Minister of Indian Affairs & Northern
Development amends the Indian Act. CARRIED.

## **RESOLUTION #5:**

Chief Ether Deleary, Chippewas of Thames Chief Norman Aguonie, Sheguiandah Band

BE IT RESOLVED THAT we the Chiefs of the Union of Ontario Indians request that the support program for Native recreation currently administered by Recreation Canada, Fitness & Amateur Sports Branch, be immediately transferred to the Department of Indian Affairs for administration.

FURTHER THAT a new five-year program be jointly developed between the Indian organizations and the Department of Indian Affairs and Northern Development that will reflect funding needs and objectives of the Native Peoples.

FURTHER THAT this program will not affect recreation funds currently allocated to Bands by the Department of Indian Affairs and Northern Development.

Chief Wilfred Owl, Spanish River Chief Wilfred Dokis, Dokis Band

THAT the Ontario Ministry of Culture and Recreation, Indian Community Secretariat Branch, direct two-thirds of their allotment of funds to the Bands across Ontario. AND WHEREAS that a field representative should be appointed just to deal with Indian Bands.

### RESOLUTION #8:

Chief Charles Shawkence, Kettle Point Chief Ron Boissoneau, Garden River WHEREAS the Kettle Point Indian Reserve are experiencing very serious problems in the areas of fishing and hunting rights,

NOW THEREFORE, all the Chiefs of the Union of Ontario Indians completely and fully support the 14 Indian persons which have been charged for fishing on their reserves, and

FURTHER THAT a full and complete investigation be done by the office of the Union of Ontario Indians and a full report be given to the Kettle Point Indian Reserve in trying to resolve the situation to the satisfaction of the Chief and Council.

## RESOLUTION #9:

Chief Charles Shawkence, Kettle Point Chief Norman Aguonie, Sheguiandah

WHEREAS it is expedient and advisable to establish a War Chest,

NOW THEREFORE, the Chiefs of the Union of Ontario Indians authorize the establishment of an Indian War Chest, and

FURTHER, Chief Peter Johnston, recommends

that all the Bands of the Union of Ontario Indians voluntarily contribute an offering of \$50.00 in order to defend and to protect Indian hunting and fishing cases and that these funds be administered by the Executive of the Union of Ontario Indians, and FURTHER, that a listing be made available to Bands indicating the offering made and the amount collected.

## RESOLUTION #10:

Chief Charles Shawkence, Kettle Point Chief Ron Boissoneau, Garden River

WHEREAS a large number of status Indian people have not been registered with the Province of Ontario, and WHEREAS some status Indian people are incorrectly registered, BE IT RESOLVED, THEREFORE, that the Chiefs of the Union of Ontario Indians strongly recommend Birth Registration to the Province of Ontario to take the following procedure: THAT a knowledgeable status Indian Senior Citizen be sworn in, in a form of an affidavit as legal evidence for Birth Registration with respect to status Indian people who are not registered, or incorrectly registered with the Province as it relates to the specific situation of the Indian concerned.

#### BE IT RESOLVED THAT:

WHEREAS the Union of Ontario Indians'
Executive have received Resolutions from
Band Councils for action on environmental
problems in Southern Ontario, and
WHEREAS the Federal and Provincial governmental agencies are conducting large
environmental contaminants testing for fish,
water, and residents for Reserves represented
by the Union of Ontario Indians in 1978, and

## RESOLUTION #11: (continued)

WHEREAS the Union of Ontario Indians'
Executive are being asked to participate
in environmental tripartite committees
and environmental public hearings,

NOW THEREFORE, the Union of Ontario Indians'
Executive should secure funds to operate an
environmental group of resource people for
the Bands who wish to investigate environmental issues within the jurisdiction of the
Union of Ontario Indians.

## RESOLUTION #12:

Mr. Frank Shawbedees, Saugeen Chief Camille Chiblow, Mississauga

#### BE IT RESOLVED THAT:

WHEREAS the Band Council of Reserve #58 of Long Lac are aware of environmental health problems associated with their drinking water, and

WHEREAS the Reserve has only a septic tank sewage system for individual residences, and WHEREAS the creek (Sucker Creek which flows from Sucker Lake) which supplies drinking water to the Reserve is stagnant because of three beaver dams, and

WHEREAS a farm on the shore of Sucker Lake contaminates the lake with animal manure and urine along with the overflow of the farm septic tank, and

WHEREAS this situation was reported to the zone office of Health and Welfare Canada and no answer has been received,

## RESOLUTION #12: (continued)

THEREFORE, the Union of Ontario Indians should contact the appropriate government agencies to

- Provide a central sewage system for the Reserve
- 2) Get permission to remove the beaver dams from Sucker Creek
- 3) Ensure for adequate controls on the agricultural waste dumping on the shores of Sucker Lake
- 4) To facilitate drinking water quality testing by Health and Welfare Canada.

### RESOLUTION #13:

Chief Timothy Esquega, Gull Bay Band Chief Leslie Dolson, Muncey of the Thames

WHEREAS the 4 regions of the Union of Ontario

Indians are experiencing serious fishing and hunting privileges, and
WHEREAS the Ontario Ministry of Natural
Resources, acting as agent of the Federal
government enforcing the Game and Fisheries
Act, allows its officers to directly misquote the law, thereby causing undue confusion from one area to the next.
NOW THEREFORE, the Robinson-Superior Treaty
Chiefs request the Chiefs of the Union of
Ontario Indians to initiate action to
require the Ontario Ministry of Natural
Resources to make a uniform statement through
all its officers on the hunting and fishing

regulations in order to be consistent to law.

### RESOLUTION #14:

Mr. Ben Wawia, Vice-President, Robinson-Superior Mr. Frank Shawbedees, Saugeen

THAT the Chiefs of the Union of Ontario Indians support the following Bands that are asking for land and additional land, namely, Pic Mobert Band, Rocky Bay Band, Long Lac #58 Band, Whitesand Band and Sand Point Band.

### RESOLUTION #15:

Chief Frank Solomon, Chippewas of Nawash Chief Charles Shawkence, Kettle Point

BE IT RESOLVED THAT we the Chiefs of Ontario stand united in that the Department of Indian Affairs be solely responsible for all status Indians' health and welfare, and FURTHER THAT we reject in its entirity all forms of payment by status Indian people as required or proposed by the Department of Health and Welfare.

### RESOLUTION #16:

Mr. Frank Shawbedees, Saugeen Chief Margaret Jones, Shawanaga

WHEREAS a large number of status Indian children have been adopted by non-status people and are removed from the regular Band List, and

WHEREAS these children that are adopted are entered onto an "A-LIST' in the Department of Indian Affairs and Northern Development files, and

## RESOLUTION #16: (continued)

WHEREAS the adopted children are not advised upon maturity of their Indian Rights or to which Band they have membership in,

THEREFORE, may it be further resolved that the President of the Union of Ontario Indians strike a recognized permanent Committee comprised of four members from the four recognized Indian organizations in Ontario and one member from the Department of Indian Affairs and Northern Development with one official from the Ontario Co-ordinators Office from Adoption, and one from the Children's Aid Society.

THE purpose of this recognized permanent
Committee is to prepare a policy that will
protect the potential parents and Indian Bands
concerned regarding status Indian children who
have been surrendered for adoption by the
parent or parents and guaranteeing no infringement on human rights of the people concerned.
AND when this policy is completed it should be
presented to the Chiefs of Ontario for ratification prior to necessary legislation regarding the Child Welfare Act.

WHEREAS the Indian Economic Development Direct Loan Order has been approved and registered under number SOR/78-22, December 29, 1977 PC 1977-3609. Canada Gazette Part II, Vol. 112, No. 1, and

# RESOLUTION #17: (continued)

WHEREAS Section 8 under the heading "Security" Sub-section (1), paragraph (a), states a mortgage on real property or a chattel mortgage on personal property may be required of the borrower to give as security for a direct loan, and

WHEREAS this directly encroaches on the protection of Indian Rights under Section 89, subsection (1) of the Indian Act.

The Chiefs of the Union of Ontario Indians do hereby resolve that this paragraph be revoked and strickened from this order retroactively, and that this be amended through His Excellency the GOVERNOR GENERAL IN COUNCIL.

### RESOLUTION #18:

Chief Paul Goulais, Nipissing Band Chief Camille Chiblow, Mississauga Band

THAT at the next All-Chiefs meeting in August, that the first part of the Agenda be taken up by the Chiefs and thier concerns instead of have the Department of Indian Affairs and Northern Development or the Provincial Government officials come in and waste quite a lot of our time to explain, or shall we say drum into our heads what has already been said to us at regional meetings and through correspondence with Bands.

### RESOLUTION #19:

Chief Norman Aguonie, Sheguiandah Chief Ray Rogers, Chippewas of Sarnia

THAT the Chiefs of the Robinson-Huron Region recommend that a Hiring Committee be set up to hire a new Regional Director General of Ontario within the Department of Indian Affairs and Northern Development.

### RESOLUTION #20:

THE FOLLOWING WAS READ OUT BY THE RESOLUTION COMMITTEE. THE DECISION WAS THAT THIS BE TABLED UNTIL THE ALL-ONTARIO CHIEFS MEETING:

THAT the Chiefs of the Robinson-Huron Region recommend that the Constitution Committee from our Region meet with the Committees from the other Regions to come up with final recommendations to changes of the Union of Ontario Indians' Constitution.

### RESOLUTION #21:

THAT the Chiefs of the Union of Ontario
Indians strongly recommend that the Department
of Indian Affairs and Northern Development
should not fund non-status Indian organizations
and should fund only Indian Status and
Band Councils, and
THAT the Department of Indian Affairs should
release all information of what funds
non-status or any other organizations that the
Department is funding.

## RESOLUTION #22:

Chief Wilfred Owl, Spanish River Chief Ray Rogers, Chippewas of Sarnia

FOR support of the Chiefs of the Union of Ontario Indians and all other Provincial Indian Organizations and the National Indian Brotherhood:

THAT all lands known as Camp Ipperwash be returned to Kettle & Stoney Point Reserve and all demands made by that Band in regards to that land appropriated by National Defence, Government of Canada, in 1942.

### RESOLUTION #23:

Mr. Aubrey Coppaway, Curve Lake Chief Ether Deleary, Chippewas of the Thames

THAT the Chiefs and Delegates of the Union of Ontario Indians request that the Department of Indian Affairs and Northern Development make available work program as a supplement to the subsidy Housing Program.

THAT WHEREAS the Bands in Ontario are experiencing great difficulty in meeting the housing needs of their communities with the present Housing Program Funds available.

WHEREAS the specific areas concerned are:

- Providing for the housing needs of new family formations on a year to year basis;
- 2) Replacement of all existing uninhabitable and unrepairable housing;
- 3) Updating and renovating of the older and recently constructed houses to present National Housing Codes and Central Mortgage

# RESOLUTION #23: (continued)

- and Housing Corporation standards, i.e. adequate insulation factor and completion of partially constructed units, etc.,
- 4) Installation of water and sanitation facilities on all new and older houses;
- 5) That Bands also receive assistance in the planning and installation of central water and sewage systems.

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED that the Chiefs and Delegates of the Union of Ontario Indians request that the Department of Indian Affairs and Northern Development make available to all Bands the necessary funds to provide for the construction and installation in completion of all the normal housing requirements as demanded by the National Housing Corporation and C.M.H.C. standards, and FURTHER THAT these units be prepared and ready for occupancy through the program dollars requested.
