WHEREAS, the Government of Canada is in the process of patriating the Constitution;

AND WHEREAS, such patriation will not recognize and protect the rights of our Anishinabe Nations.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT the Chiefs of the Anishinabe Nations assembled here today, November 27, 1980, do wholeheartedly endorse and ratify the Position Paper (with noted amendments) as developed by the Constitution Committee;

AND FURTHER THAT this document shall be used in representing the position of our Anishinabe Nations in any negotiations or presentations attempting to secure and protect our rights.

CARRIED.

MOTION #14: Chief Aubrey Coppaway, Curve Lake Ernie Edgar, Mississaugas of Scugog

WHEREAS, the present activities of the Canadian Government surrounding the patriation of its' Constitution seriously endangers the survival of the Anishinabek;

AND WHEREAS, this situation has caused the Chiefs and members of our Nations to clarify and state our position and our rights as Nations in Canada;

## MOTION #14 CONTINUED:

AND WHEREAS, this situation has further caused us to state our unity and singleness of purpose in stating and supporting our position;

THE Chiefs of the Anishinabek assembled at this Special All Chiefs Constitutional Meeting in Sault Ste. Marie, November 25, 26 & 27, 1980, do hereby resolve that we will attempt to have our "Position Paper" endorsed and adopted by each Band through Band Council Resolution.

### MOTION #15:

Chief Wilmer Noganosh, Magnetawan Chief Flora Tabobondung, Parry Island

WHEREAS, the Chiefs and Delegates of the Anishinabek assembled at a Special All Chiefs Meeting in Sault Ste. Marie, November 25, 26 & 27, 1980, have endorsed and adopted the Position Paper developed by their Constitution Committee.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT to further show our support for the paper, we will affix our signatures on attached pages to the Position Paper.

#### CARRIED.

#### MOTION #16:

Fred Simpson, Alderville Chief Reno Dokis, Dokis

WHEREAS, the actions necessary to secure and protect our rights as the Anishinabek will be costly;

AND WHEREAS, we do not have the available funds to meet such costs;

WE THEREFORE RESOLVE THAT an Ontario Lottery be established to help offset the said costs.

MOTION #16
CONTINUED:

WE FURTHER DIRECT the staff of the Union of Ontario Indians' Office in Toronto, Ontario, to make available such necessary resources to develop and implement the establishment of the Ontario Lottery.

CARRIED.

MOTION #17: Lucille Rice, Parry Island Chief Toussant Michano, Pic Heron Bay

WHEREAS, at an All Chiefs Assembly of the Union of Ontario Indians held in Sault Ste. Marie, July 1, 2 & 3, 1980, the Chiefs established a Constitution Committee to develop their position with respect to their rights;

AND WHEREAS, this Committee has completed this position paper and presented it to the Chiefs at an All Chiefs Assembly, November 25, 26 & 27, 1980, for ratification;

AND WHEREAS, it is recognized that the recognition and protection of our rights as stated in the position paper will not come without further work by the Constitution Committee.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT the Chiefs of the Anishinabek assembled at a Special All Chiefs Meeting in Sault Ste. Marie, November 25, 26 & 27, 1980, do hereby support the continued work of the Constitution Committee to act on our behalf in securing the recognition and protection of our rights as stated in the position paper.

MOTION #18: Leonard Dokis, Dokis
Aileen Irons, Curve Lake

WHEREAS, we the Anishinabe Nations affirm our identity and traditions;

AND WHEREAS, we hold strongly that our spiritual beliefs and practices are the foundation and strength of our Nations;

AND WHEREAS, our rights and way of life as Nations are seriously being threatened.

WE the Chiefs of the Anishinabe Nations hereby resolve, at this Special Assembly, November 25, 26 & 27, 1980, that our spiritual advisors be involved in our efforts to secure and protect our rights.

CARRIED.

# MOTION #19: Chief Flora Tabobondung, Parry Island Leonard Dokis, Dokis

WHEREAS, our Nations have always recognized the need and importance of joining with the other Nations for peace, strength and unity of purpose;

AND WHEREAS, we have communicated to the Chiefs of all Nations of this land, through a letter from Chief Norman Stinson, our desire to form a First Nations Confederacy, to join together with those Nations;

AND WHEREAS, the Chiefs of the Nations shall meet again in Ottawa on November 30 and December 1 and 2, 1980;

NOW THEREFORE WE RESOLVE THAT at the Assembly of First Nations, we shall propose the formation of a First Nations Confederacy;

THAT our Chiefs who attend this Assembly shall have the authority to act on our behalf and to bind our Nations in the formation of this Confederacy.

### MOTION #19 CONTINUED:

THAT the following principles shall govern the Confederacy:

- All Nations in the Confederacy are equal.

  No Nation shall see itself as more important than any other;
- Each Nation shall speak through Chiefs or other persons it shall appoint as Speakers;
- Decisions in the Assembly of Chiefs shall be through consensus, not majority rule;
- The Assembly of Chiefs shall be the body that makes the laws of the Confederacy;
- In this Assembly, the Chiefs shall sit in the Councils of their Nations;
- A Government of the Confederacy shall be formed. It shall have those powers which the Chiefs will agree to give it and shall act as Speakers for the Confederacy;
- The Speakers shall have the power to speak for and act for the Chiefs on those matters which they have been given the power to do so. They shall not act or speak without authority;
- Nations do not lose their sovereignty or national identity upon joining the Confederacy.
   The Confederacy has only those powers which the Nations agree to share.

MOTION #20: Chief Camille Chiblow, Mississauga Chief Toussant Michano, Pic Heron Bay

WHEREAS, the Government of Canada has committed many violations of our rights in the past;

AND WHEREAS, we have no trust in the Government of Canada and feel that it will not recognize and protect our rights in good faith;

AND WHEREAS, our rights must be recognized and protected within the Constitution of Canada;

THEREFORE WE RESOLVE THAT we prefer the recognition and protection of our rights to be placed in an Act of the Parliament of Great Britain, which will continue to be binding on Canada.

AND THAT this Act be amended only upon agreement between the federal government of Canada and our Nations;

AND THAT this, our preferance, not be understood or construed to mean that other forms of recognition and protection are not acceptable to us.

CARRIED.

MOTION #21: Ben Wawia, Lake Helen Chief Norman Aquonie, Shequiandah

> WHEREAS, the activities surrounding the attainment of the recognition and protection of our rights will be expensive in financial terms;

AND WHEREAS, the present funding available is inadequate to offset these costs;

AND WHEREAS, this work is a high priority of the Chiefs of the Anishinabe Nations;

MOTION #21 CONTINUED:

AND WHEREAS, in the past when priority issues have arisen, the Bands who are members of the Union of Ontario Indians have contributed to fund those issues;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT the Chiefs,
Delegates and Staff assembled here today will
contribute personally to the Union of Ontario
Indians' Constitution Fund.

AND FURTHER THAT the Chiefs will work at their Reserves to raise money to contribute to the Constitution Fund.

CARRIED.

MOTION #22:

Chief Reno Dokis, Dokis Chief Norman Stinson, Chippewas of Rama

WHEREAS, there is the need for unity within Canada among the Aboriginal Nations;

AND WHEREAS, there is a need to work with all groups and organizations to further our goals of the recognition and protection of our rights;

AND WHEREAS, the National Office, National Indian Brotherhood, needs a show of support for their work on our behalf;

AND WHEREAS, certain forces within the Indian political framework may be working to create disunity and separation at the First Nations Constitutional Assembly in Ottawa, November 30, December 1 and 2, 1980;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT the Chiefs of the Anishinabe Nations assembled here in Sault Ste. Marie on November 27, 1980, do hereby restate their support for our National Office, National Indian Brotherhood, and we further restate our intention of continued participation and cooperation in working with our National Office.

MOTION #22

CONTINUED: FURTHERMORE, we restate our support for the leadership of the National Office, Del Riley

and Sykes Powderface.

CARRIED.

MOTION #23: Roger Nakanagis, Rocky Bay
Chief Flora Tabobondung, Parry Island

WHEREAS, a Constitution Committee was formed by resolution at an All Chiefs Assembly of the Union of Ontario Indians held in Sault Ste. Marie, July 1, 2 & 3, 1980;

AND WHEREAS, this Committee has developed, distributed and presented a detailed accounting of their activities and recommended directions in the form of a document entitled <u>Plan for Action</u> presentation to the General Assembly of Chiefs, November 25, 26 & 27, 1980;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT we the Chiefs of the Anishinabek do hereby accept the Action Plan as presented.

CARRIED.

MOTION #24: Chief Joe Thompson, Rocky Bay Chief Reno Dokis, Dokis

WHEREAS, the Board of Directors of the Union of Ontario Indians have examined and given their support to two actions intended to create unity among the different Aboriginal Nations in North America;

AND WHEREAS, the Board has passed motions on these two directions;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT we the Chiefs of the Anishinabe Nations do hereby support and adopt these resolutions as read.

The resolutions read as follows:

MOTION #24 CONTINUED:

"That Walt Bressette be approached to co-ordinate a Council of the Chiefs of the Nations on both sides of the Lakes next summer in the Sault or Mackinack, contingent on funds available."

"That we the Board of Directors approve of renewing our relations and Treaties with the Six Nations Confederacy and that a meeting in Toronto be co-ordinated to identify areas in which we can work in unison.

And that we give our approval of presenting presents to the MicMac Grand Council and the possible co-ordination of a joint meeting.

And that in looking at the future of the Union of Ontario Indians in the context of the Anishinabek, we approve the new letterhead using the Thunderbird symbol and government by Grand Council of the Chiefs of the Nations."

CARRIED.

MOTION #25:

Chief Ron Wakegijig, Wikwemikong Chief Joe Thompson, Rocky Bay

WHEREAS, the Union of Ontario Indian Chiefs and Councils consider the improvement of Indian health and Indian health services, within the Union of Ontario Indians' territory, a priority issue;

AND WHEREAS, the Federal Government has provided consultation funds and the Union of Ontario Indian Chiefs and Councils wish to continue consultation on an on-going basis;

AND WHEREAS, the Union of Ontario Indian Chiefs and Councils recognize that it is necessary to develop new health strategies to supercede present health policy;

MOTION #25 CONTINUED:

BE IT RESOLVED THAT this assembly of Chiefs and Delegates of November 27, 1980, support and endorse the continued work of the Union of Ontario Indians' Health Steering Committee.

AND THAT IT THEREFORE designates this Health Steering Committee as a Sub-Committee of the Union of Ontario Indians' Board of Directors and charges this Sub-Committee with the responsibility for developing a document on achieving "Indian control of Indian health."

CARRIED.

MOTION #26: Gertrude Lewis, Serpent River Chief Norman Aguonie, Sheguiandah

THAT we adopt and use the following spelling, "ANISHINABEK" in all future correspondence and references to our Nations.

CARRIED.

MOTION #27: Chief William Antoine, Sheshegwaning Elsie Knott, Curve Lake

WHEREAS, since earliest times we have been wrongfully referred to as Indians;

AND WHEREAS, we wish to correct this mistake and restate our true identities to the world;

AND WHEREAS, in our language we refer to ourselves as Anishinabek;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT we wish to be called Anishinabek by the other governments in any future dealings or relations between ourselves and those governments.

MOTION #28: Chief Ray Rogers, Chippewas of Sarnia Chief Flora Tabobondung, Parry Island

BE IT RESOLVED THAT we the Chiefs of the Anishinabek advise the Union of Ontario Indians to move immediately to establish a separate and distinct fund to be known as the Constitution Fund. The responsibility for the administration of the fund will be with the Constitution Committee.

FURTHER, all monies donated towards the Constitution Fund other than Government funds will be deposited in this Fund.

THAT we adjourn.
